# There is a strong tradition of free markets in capital, labour, and business with ready access to capital:

→ Entrepreneurship and risk taking are not only encouraged, but celebrated. This is coupled with extensive and accessible capital markets which enabled new development.




#### Simple claim and royalty process on federal lands:

→ Development on federal lands is relatively simple, although is more complicated today, with additional environmental regulatory compliance requirements.



#### There is universal primary and secondary education and a well-regarded higher education system:

 $\rightarrow$  As an early leader in universal public education, a core, educated workforce was available.




Highest Level of Education Attained by Persons 25 Years and Older. Source: U.S. Department of Education and NCES (2003)



## Highly skilled workforce and liberal labour immigration capability, especially for skilled labour:

→ The open labour market promotes development of in-demand skills and allows for the importation of skilled labour.

#### Government data, maps, and reports are in the public domain:

→ Without the investment by government in basic data collection, analysis, and research, private-sector development costs would have been substantially higher and success lower.



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## There are state-level recycling initiatives:

→ A number of states have carried out experiments with recycling and materials management policies, leading to innovations to meet requirements.



## There is strong protection of private ownership and separable mineral rights from land rights:

 $\rightarrow$  Building on a strong rule of law, the ability to purchase mineral rights separately from land enabled more efficient land use policies and better financial intensity of land value.
